A Dream Come True . . . Returning to SLC 25 Years Later

Since I left SLC 25 years ago, I have had many dreams of being in camp again.

Late spring 1977, my mother took me for a crew cut and explained that she was going to send me out of the sweltering, dangerous streets of Brooklyn to upstate, NY for three weeks

at sleep away camp. Being just seven years old and attached at the hip to my mother, I got on the bus in Coney Island kicking and screaming. Needless to say, the heart and soul of Surprise Lake Camp enveloped me and took me in. For the next eight summers, I got on that same bus smiling, and instead, I was kicking and screaming when it was time to go home!! I often tell people that Surprise Lake saved my life. It got me out of Brooklyn, taught me to survive in camp, and gave me the ability to adapt to new surrounding and people from all walks of life. Back then, there were 4 boys to a bunk separate from the counselors, and no electricity! SLC definitely played a major role in molding me into the man I am today.

Fast forward 25 years; I am now married and the proud father of three great little girls ages 10, 9, and 5. They have heard thousands of stories about my life in camp, and finally, my two oldest begged me to go to camp. Living in Florida, it was hard to imagine sending them a thousand miles away to Cold Spring, NY. So we decided to take a trip in the fall of 2009 to show camp to my family and see if camp was still what I remembered it to be. We arrived at SLC (it was October), and the weather could not have been any worse - bitter cold and pouring! Camp was holding its fall Tour Day, and our tour guides were Sheryl and Ken, camp's Director and Assistant Director. While I had never met Sheryl before, there was an instant chemistry, and the SLC culture, heart, and spirit was so apparent, even through the rain clouds and blistering winds. My entire family was in consensus - my children needed to be at SLC. Sheryl and my wife, Laura, got to talking, and Laura was offered the job of running Cedarwood, the Two Week Program. Since I am an independent investment advisor, I am fortunate to be able to work remotely from anywhere. So we decided that all of us, including me, would move to SLC for first session!

Over the past decade or two, many "fancy" camps have been created, complete with motor boats, air conditioning, internet in the cabins, etc. I must say that after spending a month back at camp, nothing compares to the SLC experience. "Roughing it" with no a/c, hiking with Whammy (yes Whammy was in camp when I was a child!), singing old songs, confidence building exercises, and the strong Jewish heritage, along with incredible staff and amazing kids, in my mind, is the recipe for the most amazing place on earth. I can say with confidence that Surprise Lake Camp is not only the same place that my fondest memories recall, it's even better! It is a <u>true</u> camp experience! I am so thrilled to have had this opportunity to relive my experiences, but more importantly, to have my three daughters touched by the same heart and soul of SLC that touched me when I was as a child. While there are no motor boats or a/c, I see something even better . . . smiling faces. Once again, as the session comes to an end, I am leaving kicking and screaming, and not wanting to go home. Being a 40 year old man with three children, my perspective has changed, because now I am seeing camp through my children's eyes. But my feelings remain the same. I now fully understand why this place, "nestled 'neath the shady trees," has prospered through two world wars, recessions, etc. I expect that my children will be going to SLC for many years to come, and I will do everything in my power to refer as many people as I can to this fantastic place. This summer was truly a dream come true.

From the Campers . . .

Hi! I'm Rebecca Lantner and I am a camper in Work Program. So far, this session has been a blast. For me, the Work Program experience has been different from any other summer at camp. We are training to be future staff members here at SLC, and because we are in WP, we receive special privileges that ordinary campers would not have. For example, being part staff and part camper, we are allowed to spend time in the Mainside canteen with staff at night, but also get to participate in Teenside activities like specialty and out-of-camp trips. As Work Program campers, we have blocks of time in either the morning or afternoon when we work. Each week, we are assigned to new jobs, ranging from Counselor Aide or Canteen Aide to Kitchen Aide or Office Aide. Besides working part time at camp, the Work Program counselors teach us lessons that emotionally prepare us for life as staff. We engage in activities that promote teamwork and communication, and that really help us to grow both as individuals and as a group. Overall, I feel that Work Program is more that just a fun summer; the skills we learn here will benefit us throughout our lives.



Hi, I'm Tyler Shatesky and I'm in Work Program, Session 1. Work Program is this great experience that you share with nineteen other teenagers. So far, I have been able to try out jobs in two areas of camp. First, I was a Mountainview Boys CA. It was so much fun! The kids and I really connected, and they looked up to me, which felt awesome. I love how they still yell my name and run up to me with news to tell me, even though I'm not working with them anymore. My second job was helping the programming aide. The current aide showed me the ropes, and I learned how to do her job, as well as other jobs in the office. When I was assigned to the office, I thought it was going to be boring and that I wouldn't like it, but I ended up having fun and meeting a bunch of very nice people.

As a group of twenty (plus four counselors), our Work Program group has really bonded. We've all improved our leadership skills, our teamwork, and our communication skills. We have come to trust each other and I believe that as a group, we can overcome anything that is thrown at us. Being in Work Program is very different than being a normal camper, but it is amazing because you become such close friends with everyone, and I feel we'll be friends forever. So far, Work Program has helped me to learn how to become a great future staff member, and a greater person in general. I will remember this experience forever.

SLC Olympics 2010

Alumni, campers, parents, staff members, and friends collected legos from all over the country and sent them in to a very happy Whammy. Whammy even created a Lego Facebook group, and before we knew it, we had Legos arriving almost daily at SLC. Our biggest donors, Laura and Carter Mansbach, donated an impressive 110 pounds of Legos! "I attended Surprise Lake Camp as a camper 25 years ago," Carter explained. "When I saw that Whammy was looking for Legos, I made it my mission to collect as many Legos as I possibly could. I loved Olympics when I was a camper, I loved the Lego idea, and I wanted to do anything that I could to help out. I also did it as a sign of gratitude towards SLC for welcoming me and my family back to camp with open arms."

The Lego creations, team plaques, songs, and cheers were presented to the judges in the late afternoon at the Eddie Cantor. As the campers headed to dinner, the scores were tallied. Exhausted as everyone was, the campers and staff returned to the theater after dinner, still bursting with ruach (spirit). It was time for the All Camp Show (which was rained out the night before). Mainside and Teenside performed their shows, the Jeff Herman Award was given, and of course ice cream was distributed, all while sitting by Olympic teams. While sitting in the midst of this excitement, and right before the winning team was announced, I realized why Surprise Lake Camp is such a special place to be. Instead of fighting against each other, the four teams of Olympics supported and cheered for one another. In the end, it did not matter to the campers who won or who lost. At the end of a long day of competitions, judging, legos, and cheering, we ended the day together, as one camp, as one family, nestled neath' the shady trees.


