

I often talk about all of the wonderful skills and abilities I gained and honed at SLC that helped make me the person I am today. But one of the most notable things I gained was an absolute LOVE of hiking -- so much so that I sometimes come back to SLC (with friends/alums) to relive those hikes. In addition, I also have hiked in some of the most beautiful places in the world. So, once the SLC Alumni Association began organizing autumn Hiking Days, I was thrilled. And needless to say, I have participated in MANY of them over the years. And this year was no exception.

Now for me, Hiking Day actually begins on the 90-minute car ride up to camp. As I continue to travel north, I begin to notice the




change in foliage color -- from mostly green to an incredible mix of reds, yellows and oranges. By the time I get close to camp, the mountains almost appear to be on fire. It takes my breath away.

I had signed up to do the Firetower Hike -- probably my all-time FAVORITE hike in the hills surrounding SLC and one I have gone on (and even LED) many times before. This time, it was going to be led by one Barry Vegter (nicknamed 'Ranger Barry' by yours truly so many years ago). Now I haven't seen RB in quite a while and was looking forward to reconnecting with him a bit in addition to just completing this specific hike. So, on this particular morning, I was lucky enough to enter camp right in front of Barry (and his wife, Marlene), giving us a chance to catch up a bit as we walked towards the Main Building before the hike.

After catching up with other longtime camp friends, we were all told to gather near the flagpole for a brief, general Hike Day Orientation -- given by the one-and-only Whammy. Then we split up into our separate hiking groups.

Ranger Barry met with us near Mainside Arts & Crafts to discuss the particulars of the Firetower Hike. The challenging portions of the hike were emphasized. Then it came time to choose a 'Sweep' -- a person whose job it was to remain in the rear of the group and make sure no one falls behind and possibly gets





separated from the rest, increasing the chances that he or she will get (GASP!) lost. Having been on the hike so many times before, I volunteered and was so chosen. With this important requirement in place, we set out on the hike proper.

We walked through the ballfield, into the woods and past First Outpost. We then picked up a path, fittingly nicknamed (with ACTUAL signs) 'The Ranger Barry Trail'. We continued hiking, periodically stopping at certain 'intersections' to flip a coin and decide which way we would proceed. As I mentioned above, the foliage was absolutely BEAUTIFUL in its varying colors. We continued to hike uphill, occasionally passing certain viewpoints, where we could see incredible scenes through the trees and into the distance.

Then at one point, Barry stopped us again to 'prepare' us for a steep, rocky incline, charmingly nicknamed 'Devil's Ladder'. The steepness was so great that he advised us to use hand-over-hand climbing as we made our way forward (and upward) -- and so we did. And while this portion of the hike was rather challenging, you couldn't help but appreciate the amazing views -- views of the mountains all around us, views of the Hudson River, and even faint views of the New York City Skyline (!) in the far distance.

Barry also let us know that the actual Firetower would be invisible until we get to the very top of Devil's Ladder -- and then suddenly appear out of nowhere. And so it happened.

Once we reached the Firetower, the group broke up into smaller subgroups to eat lunch -- and for many -- for climbs up the actual Firetower. Now, when I worked at camp, the no-longer used Firetower fell into disrepair. Wooden platforms on the way up the tower were often rotted or missing completely. However, since then, the Tower has been declared something of a 'landmark' and renovated. Those old, rotted wooden platforms have been replaced by intact metal ones -- making the climb up a MUCH safer endeavor.

Also of interest were the sheer number of non-SLC hikers visiting the tower that day, eating lunch and enjoying the incredible views. Perhaps even more interesting were the number of DOGS (!) people chose to bring along on their hike.

After a bit, Barry called out to the group to prepare for the hike back to camp. Now while SOME non-SLC hikers chose to walk DOWN Devil's Ladder, we wisely chose the Red Dot trail. Not that it didn't have its own share of steep-ish downhills, but it was far less treacherous than Devil's Ladder in reverse. Again, the hike back allowed us to marvel at the incredible foliage and the occasional terrific views through the trees.

After a while, we ended up on the camp road, just before Caretaker Gene's house. We completed this last leg of the hike, with various hikers now proceeding at their own pace. Again, I had a chance to reconnect a bit with Ranger Barry and we each thanked each other for the roles we played on the hike. And as I approached the Main Building once again, I couldn't help but think about this, my favorite hike. And how I couldn't wait until I get a chance to do it once again.
